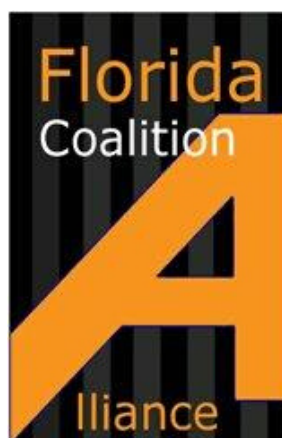

# Guest Speakers

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## **Vice Admiral Jerome M. Adams, M.D., M.P.H., Surgeon General of the United States**

Dr. Jerome Adams is the 20th Surgeon General of the United States. His mission as the “Nation’s Doctor,” is to advance the health of the American people. Dr. Adams’ motto as Surgeon General is “better health through better partnerships.” He is committed to strengthening relationships with all members of the health community, and forging new partnerships with members from the business, faith, education, and public safety and national security communities.

As the Surgeon General, Dr. Adams holds the rank of Vice Admiral in the U.S. Public Health Service Commissioned Corps. In this capacity, he oversees the operations of approximately 6,500 uniformed health officers who serve in nearly 800 locations around the world, promoting, protecting, and advancing the health and safety of our nation.

During his tenure as Surgeon General, Dr. Adams has created several initiatives to tackle our nation’s most pressing health issues, including: the opioid epidemic, oral health, and the links between community health and both economic prosperity and national security. In response to the opioid epidemic, Dr. Adams issued the first Surgeon General’s Advisory in thirteen years, urging more Americans to carry naloxone, an FDA-approved medication that can reverse the effects of an opioid overdose. Dr. Adams also released Facing Addiction in America: The Surgeon General’s Spotlight on Opioids, and a digital postcard calling for a cultural shift in the way Americans think about, talk about, and respond to the opioid crisis. His Surgeon General’s postcard recommends actions that can prevent and treat opioid misuse and promote recovery. Additionally, Dr. Adams is focused on building a culture of health and prevention in all sectors. As part of those efforts, Dr. Adams has commissioned a Surgeon General’s Report to explore the connection between private sector investments and public policies leading to healthier communities and advancing business and community prosperity.

Dr. Adams received bachelor’s degrees in both biochemistry and psychology from the University of Maryland, Baltimore County, a master of public health degree from the University of California at Berkeley, and a medical degree from Indiana University School of Medicine.

He has been a leader in numerous professional organizations, including the American Medical Association, the Indiana State Medical Association and the Indiana Society of Anesthesiologists. Dr. Adams is also the former Health Commissioner of Indiana, where he led the State’s responses to Ebola, Zika, and to the largest ever HIV outbreak in the United States related to injection drug use.

He also feels his toughest, but most important job, is being a father to two teenage boys, Caden and Eli, daughter, Millie, and dog Bella.

## **Chuck Daugherty, Director, ACT Missouri**

Chuck is currently employed at ACT Missouri where he has served as Executive Director for five years. He has worked in substance abuse prevention, treatment, recovery, and advocacy for over 30 years. As a trained community organizer, he was Director of Community Mobilization at the Greater Dallas Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse for over 3 years.

His first exposure to the Alinsky model was while attending college. Since that time, he has been trained and successfully trained others in community mobilization and organization. Chuck's background with community organizing and collaboration has offered opportunities to work with many diverse communities.



## **Thomas J. Gorman, Director of Rocky Mountain HIDTA**

In 1968 Director Gorman graduated from San Jose State University and joined the California Bureau of Narcotic Enforcement. He served ten years as an undercover agent. He made 1,000 undercover purchases and received two Purple Hearts from being shot and later stabbed.

He was promoted in 1990 to deputy chief in charge of statewide drug enforcement operations. In 1997 he retired to become the director of the Rocky Mountain HIDTA.

Director Gorman is a graduate of the FBI National Academy and is past president of the California Narcotic Officers Association and the National Alliance of State Drug Enforcement Agencies. He was president of the National HIDTA Directors Association from 2005 to 2017. He authored *The Myths of Drug Legalization and Marijuana*

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Legalization: The Issues. He also authored a recently published book titled *To Believe or not Believe, That is the Question - An Undercover Agent's Quest for the Truth*.



## **Dotti Groover-Skipper, Florida Anti-Trafficking Director, The Salvation Army**

Dotti Groover-Skipper believes in dynamic living through servant leadership! Since graduating from the University of South Florida, she has facilitated expert programming to impact positive policy change in tobacco, alcohol, gambling, substance abuse, addiction, and sex trade. She has developed numerous sustainable community coalitions through powerful community engagement and influential, effective partnerships. Dotti is an ordained elder and missionary and has operated at the national level to mobilize and train clergy and faith communities to engage in issues of addiction, human rights and social justice. Dotti is credited as a catalyst to peak action against human trafficking in Tampa Bay and has been awarded many honors for her tireless work, including being honored as a Lightning Foundation Community Hero and the Florida Anti-Trafficking Advocate of the Year by former Attorney General Pam Bondi. Dotti serves on the Salvation Army Southern Territory Human Trafficking Council and serves on various local boards. She is appointed by Florida Governor Ron DeSantis to the Florida Drug Policy Advisory Council and appointed by Florida Attorney General Ashley Moody to the Statewide Council On Human Trafficking. Dotti also serves on the board of the Hillsborough County Anti-Drug Alliance. Currently employed as the Florida Division Anti-Trafficking Director for the Salvation Army, Dotti educates, trains, and resources Florida Corps on anti-trafficking initiatives and is dedicated to creating a statewide and national system of care for trafficking victims and survivors. In addition, Dotti founded HeartDance Foundation, a ministry dedicated to assisting the sexually exploited toward healing restoration. She reunited with her high school sweetheart, Roger, in 2009. Together they are the proud parents of seven grown children and grandparents of two.



## **Carlton Hall, M.H.S., Carlton Hall Consulting LLC**

Carlton Hall is the president and CEO of Carlton Hall Consulting LLC, a multi-faceted, full-service consulting organization designed to provide customized solutions and enable measurable change for communities, organizations, families, and individuals. Carlton spent twelve years with the Community Anti Drug Coalitions of America (CADCA) serving in several managerial positions, including most recently, Acting Vice President, Training Operations, and Acting Director for CADCA's National Coalition Institute, responsible for the day to day operational oversight, design, and implementation of its premiere national



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training delivery system. Carlton also supported CADCA's International Programs in partnership with the US State Department's International Narcotics Law Enforcement division (INL), managing training programs in Kenya, South Africa, and Ghana. Carlton is one of the primary architects of CADCA's National Coalition Academy. The Academy, a year-long coalition development program, is designed to increase the effectiveness of communities in drug demand reduction at population level outcomes.

With more than 25 years' experience in the fields of government, social services and prevention science, Carlton first gained national prominence as a Communities That Care® Project Manager, for the Channing Bete Company. He was a Communities That Care® trainer/senior consultant with Channing Bete Company for four years. He received his Master's in Human Services from Lincoln University in Pennsylvania. He was appointed as the Project Director for the Communities That Care® process in Philadelphia as well as the Crime and Public Safety manager for the Philadelphia Empowerment Zone, a division of the Mayor's Office of Community Services. During that time he managed a small planning grant to over three million dollars for science-based prevention programming in the neighborhoods of Philadelphia.

Carlton also was responsible for the design and implementation of the award-winning "Operation Makeover", an effective community-wide intervention addressing blatant open-air drug trafficking and increasing levels of juvenile violence and substance abuse offences. Operation Makeover was recognized by Vice-President Al Gore and featured in "Programs That Work" a publication by the Office of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). After years of volunteering with many youth organizations Carlton founded The STRONG Foundation in 1993, which created opportunities to reduce service duplication while increasing partnerships with existing youth organizations.

Carlton's responsibilities, unique set of skills and experience has made him one of the most highly sought after instructors and guides for community problem solving in every state and territory in the nation as well as internationally, with successful achievements in South Africa, Ghana, Bermuda, Kenya and others.

## **Angela Hill, PharmD, CRPh**

Dr. Angela Massey Hill is an active researcher, clinician, mentor, and post-graduate educator who has evolved through several areas of specialization to include psychiatry, neurology, and geriatrics with her first academic appointment as Assistant Professor of Clinical Practice

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at Florida A&M University College of Pharmacy in 1992. She received tenure in 2002, and achieved the rank of full professor during her tenure at Florida A&M University. She completed post-graduate training in neurology at the Neuroscience Research Foundation, Inc. She holds licenses as a registered and consultant pharmacist in the State of Florida.

Dr. Hill's clinical expertise has been further enhanced through her academic clinical appointments at Florida State Hospital, and Tallahassee Memorial Healthcare NeuroScience Center where she provided pharmacy services for their Memory Disorder Clinic, Parkinson's Clinic, Multiple Sclerosis Clinic, and Stroke Initiatives. She has also worked in retail pharmacy, and as a pharmacy consultant for long-term care facilities, Medicaid, Department of Elder Affairs, Kroger Drugs, and other clinical entities.

In 2004, Dr. Hill received a research endowment from Delta Sigma Theta Inc. to investigate biomarkers associated with the incidence of Alzheimer's disease in African Americans. This research launched her research agenda, and continues to be a focus for her research at University of South Florida.

She has developed and been involved in post-graduate training initiatives for pharmacists training at Tallahassee Memorial Healthcare, Apalachee Mental Health, Florida State Hospital, the Tallahassee Veterans Administration, and University of South Florida. She has also provided numerous lectures to pharmacists, healthcare professionals across the disciplines, and caregivers within the State of Florida, nationally, and internationally.

In 2011, Dr. Hill was hired as the founding Chair for the Department of Pharmacotherapeutics and Clinical Research at the University of South Florida College of Pharmacy. In 2014, she became the Associate Dean of Pharmacy Practice. She is currently providing clinical services at the USF Byrd Alzheimer's Institute and the Royal Sun Park Memory Care Assisted Living Facility. She is involved in comprehensive medication reviews, patient visits, drug-related research and community outreach. At the Byrd Institute, Dr. Hill works closely with the Dementia C.A.R.E. Center, collaborates with clinicians on scientific research, and speaks to groups of medical professionals and students. She also provides clinical pharmacy services at Royal Sun Memory Care Assisted Living Facility. She is passionate about helping patients and caregivers understand and manage their medications and speaks at caregiver support groups and caregiver seminars.

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## **Washington C. Hill, M.D., FACOG**

Dr. Washington Hill is the past President and Chief of the Medical Staff at Sarasota Memorial Hospital, Sarasota, Florida. He is also past Chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology and Medical Director, Labor and Delivery, at Sarasota Memorial Hospital.

He graduated from Camden High School and received his undergraduate education, a Bachelor of Arts Degree with a major in chemistry in 1961 at Rutgers University, College of South Jersey, also in Camden, New Jersey. His Doctor of Medicine Degree was received from Temple University School of Medicine in 1965. Dr. Hill interned at Walter Reed General Hospital in 1966 and spent the next nine years as a Medical Officer in the United States Army. During this time, he conducted his residency training in Obstetrics and Gynecology at William Beaumont General Hospital from 1967 until 1970. Upon finishing his residency, he was an Obstetrician/Gynecologist in Germany for three years.

After 12 years of private practice in Obstetrics and Gynecology, Dr. Hill had a career change and completed a Fellowship in Maternal-Fetal Medicine at the University of California, San Francisco and Children's Hospital of San Francisco in 1984. While there, he was also a Research Fellow at the Cardiovascular Research Institute. His research during fellowship resulted in publications on the relation of insulin-like growth factors to the macrosomia of infants of diabetic mothers. He was the first investigator to show HIV could be cultured from the human placenta. Following completion of his fellowship in Maternal-Fetal Medicine, he has practiced this subspecialty at the Perinatal Center and the University of California-Davis, Sacramento, California; Creighton University, School of Medicine, Omaha, Nebraska; Meharry Medical College, Nashville, Tennessee; and Vanderbilt University, School of Medicine, Nashville, Tennessee. He served as Chairman of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Meharry Medical College, School of Medicine, educating minority medical students and residents from 1990 until 1992, when he took the position as Director of Maternal-Fetal Medicine and The Perinatal Center of Sarasota Memorial Hospital in Sarasota, Florida.



## **William Jones III, Communications & Outreach Associate, Smart Approaches to Marijuana**

Coming from a legacy of civil rights leaders in Washington, D.C, Will Jones serves as the Communications and Outreach Associate at SAM. He is an experienced speaker and community activist working on issues of social justice at the local and national level.



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Partnering with national drug policy advisors and leaders around Washington, D.C., in 2014 Jones founded Two Is Enough DC to raise awareness of the predatory marijuana commercial industry which disproportionately targets disenfranchised communities similar to Alcohol and Big Tobacco. He later started the campaign against marijuana legalization and commercialization in D.C.

Mr. Jones has been featured on a wide variety of TV, radio, and print outlets talking about marijuana policy and other issues including NBC, Reuters TV, CBS, BBC World, Al Jazeera, C-span, the Washington Post, Huffington Post, and Associated Press.

Mr. Jones is also a husband, father and 3rd generation Washingtonian. He proudly serves as a DC Firefighter/EMT and is working on his MPA at George Washington University.



## **Kristen Kidd, MA**

Kristin Kidd, MA, recently joined the Southeast Prevention Technology Transfer Center (PTTC) at Wake Forest University School of Medicine where she develops and provides training and technical assistance to the substance misuse prevention field in the southeast. Prior to her employment with Wake Forest, Kristin was the Director of the Tobacco Control Training and Technical Assistant Team at the Colorado School of Public Health in Denver. There her team was charged with providing state-wide advocacy and policy guidance to local health agencies to eliminate tobacco disparities. Kristin has delivered numerous trainings on youth engagement, the local policy process, and the importance of evaluation. Kristin partnered with multiple Colorado communities to successfully pass local tobacco control policies such as retailer licensing and expanded smoke-free/vape-free ordinances.



## **Sam Anthony Lucania**

Sam Anthony is a person in long term recovery from substance use disorder, who uses his personal experiences with drugs, alcohol, depression, anxiety, suicidal behavior, recovery, mental fitness, spiritual fitness, and physical fitness to educate and motivate others. He took his first drink at 12 years old as a means of hiding his anxiety and depression, in addition to try and fit in with his peers. He moved on to smoking weed and trying pills in high school and that would lead him down a path of destruction. Running away from his problems, he left New Jersey and moved south in hopes of starting over. But everywhere he went, there he was. What started off as self-medication turned into a vicious addiction cycle leading to an overdose that landed him on life support in 2013.

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Thinking he could still function without help and counseling, he then continued an unhealthy lifestyle and subsequently was arrested and sentenced to 3 years in jail in 2015. Since that time, and now in recovery, Sam has passionately shared his story with thousands of high school and college students, health care professionals, and government officials through motivational talks, school assemblies and panel discussions. Sam is hoping to inspire others, provide hope for the future, and educate our youth through sharing his own personal story. Sam's message emphasizes awareness and encouragement.



## **Bertha Madras, Ph.D., Professor, Harvard Medical School**

Dr. Bertha K. Madras is Professor of Psychobiology, Department of Psychiatry at Harvard Medical School (HMS), and is cross-appointed at the Massachusetts General Hospital. At Harvard, her research focuses on neuropsychiatric diseases and addiction biology. She served as Deputy Director for Demand Reduction in the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy, a Presidential appointment confirmed unanimously by the US Senate. At ONDCP, she advocated for medicalization of the diagnosis and treatment of substance use disorders. She mainstreamed drug and alcohol Screening, Brief Intervention, Referral to Treatment in healthcare systems as a component of the national drug control strategy, spearheaded approval of billing codes for these services, reimbursement by Medicaid and health insurers, adoption by federal agencies, and garnered a UN declaration of endorsement for SBIRT. In service to the public, she directed creation of a Museum exhibit, a CD (licensed by Disney Corp), "Changing your mind: drugs in the brain" for the Boston Museum of Science and has developed presentations to clarify addiction and drug biology. She is an inventor on 19 patents, recipient of a NIDA Public Service award, a NIH MERIT award, American Academy Addiction Psychiatry Founders' Award, Marian Fischman Award. A brain imaging agent strategy she developed was cited by The Better World Report, 2006, as one of "25 technology transfer innovations that changed the world".



## **Mary Martinasek, Associate Professor Public Health at the University of Tampa**

Dr. Mary Martinasek is an Associate Professor in Public Health at the University of Tampa. She is also a registered respiratory therapist, a certified asthma educator, and a tobacco treatment specialist. Mary's research is focused on hookah and vaping. Her most recent project is a social marketing campaign to deter use of vaping devices on campus.

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## **John Redman, Californians for Drug-Free Youth (CADFY)**

John Redman is an internationally recognized speaker and discussion facilitator on drug policy issues -- particularly as they pertain to children. He is the Director of Community Alliances for Drug Free Youth. In this capacity he works to help people across industries, nonprofit organizations, faith-based institutions, and educational campuses connect, communicate, and collaborate to develop effective drug strategies. Mr. Redman is passionate about assisting specific communities because he is also an expert on national and international drug problems and sees how change at the local level could help address them.

- He has been a Delegate to the United Nations Collaboration on Global Drug Policy since 2008;
- Mr. Redman has been honored as an Ambassador of Peace with, the United Nations Middle East Peace Initiative;
- He is the recipient of the Director's Award for Distinguished Service from the Office of the President's, Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP);
- He is the recipient of the President's Call to Service Award,
- And he was honored as the Citizen of the Year from the California Narcotics Officer's Association.

He holds a B.A. in Liberal Arts from Texas A&M University, College Station, TX, (1983), an M.F.A. degree in design from San Diego State University, San Diego, CA, (1996), and a Doctor of Divinity from Sacramento Theological Seminary and Bible College.



## **Amy Ronshausen, Executive Director, Drug Free America Foundation, Inc.**

Amy Ronshausen is the new Executive Director of both Drug Free America Foundation, Inc. and Save Our Society From Drugs (S.O.S.), national nonprofit organizations that work to defeat drug legalization attempts, promote sound drug policies, and prevent drug use, abuse, and addiction.

Mrs. Ronshausen has dedicated most of her adult life to the work of reducing illegal drug use and drug prevention. In her ten years with Drug Free America Foundation and S.O.S, she has assisted in coordinating successful grassroots advocacy campaigns to defeat marijuana legalization efforts, coordinated statewide prevention summits, analyzed and tracked state and federal drug policy legislation, and trained prevention professionals at local and national conferences.



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Prior to coming to DFAF, Mrs. Ronshausen spent three years as a program specialist with the Pinellas County Adult Drug Court, working under four judges. While in drug court, Mrs. Ronshausen linked defendants with treatment providers and monitored their progress through the criminal justice system. In 2007, Mrs. Ronshausen was awarded Best Team Practices for her work in Adult Drug Court.

Mrs. Ronshausen started her work in drug prevention with Operation PAR, the largest treatment provider in Pinellas County, where she started off as a call specialist in their access center and then worked as a juvenile certified GAIN assessor. She also worked as a juvenile counselor for PAR's Adolescent Recovery Intervention Services and the Juvenile Enhancement Treatment Services and is trained in Motivational Enhancement and Cognitive Behavioral Therapy.

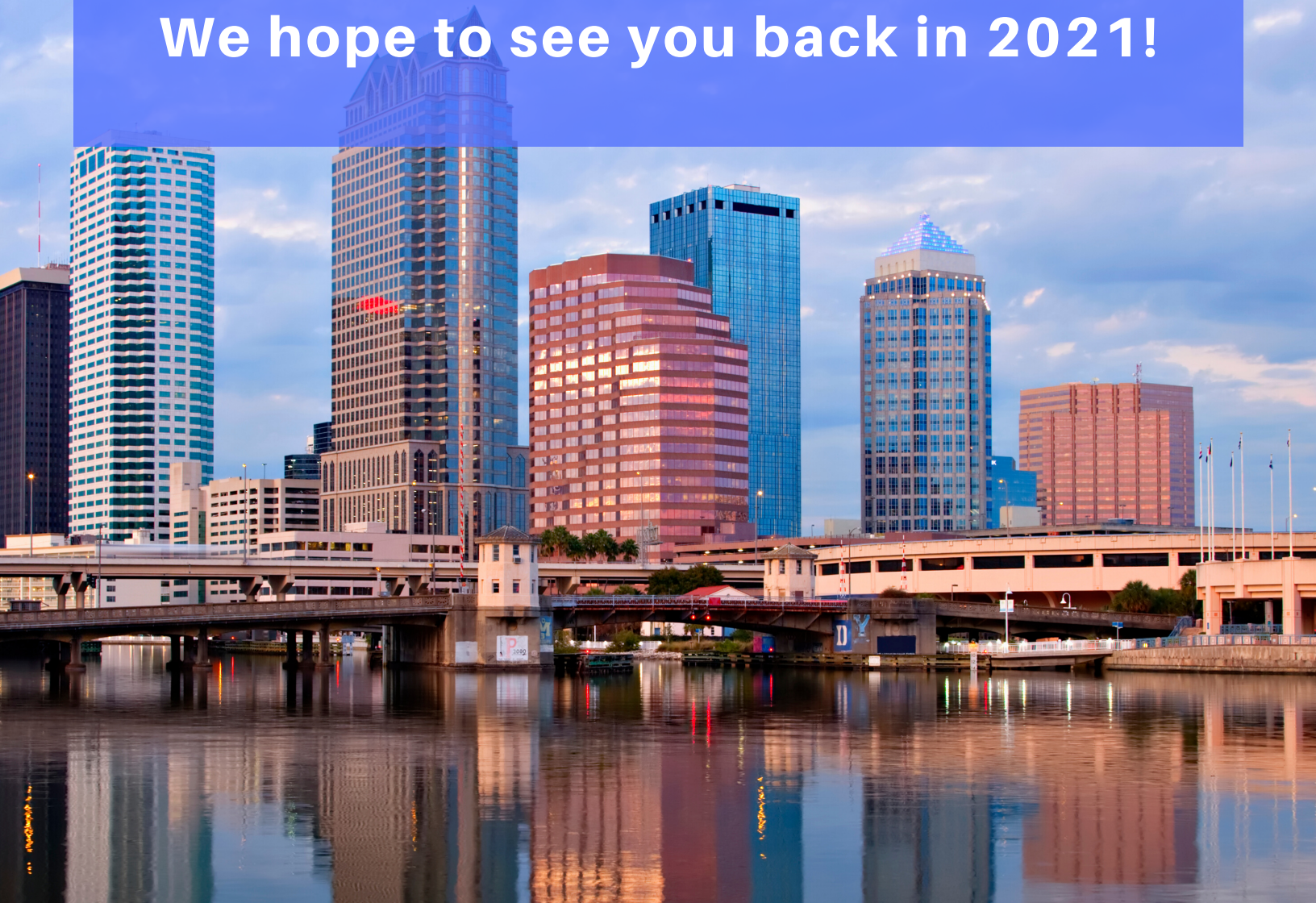
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## **Dan Zsido, NADDI National Training & Education Director**
